The mission of the program is to provide holistic support to poor children and women in to build them up educationally, socially, ethically, physically etc. so that they can be productive adult citizens of their society.

#### **MAJOR ACTIVITIES OF THE PROJECT**

The project has five major intervention areas to achieve its objectives that are considered equally important on the merit of children's holistic development need. These are: -

- 1. Health care support
- 2. Educational Support

- 3. Basic need clothe, Food and Hygnice material support
- 4. Psychosocial support
- 5. IGA (Income generating activity) for Mothers of our children

#### 2.1 Health Care support

Emphasizing disease prevention health policy we prioritized the support to underline in awareness creation teachings. Therefore, under this intervention sector some correlated activities have been taking place like:

#### 2.1.1. Medical Treatment

It was one of the health support components in which those sick children have been diagnosed and treated. Thus, most of the children were treated in different health centers and hospitals depending the severity of their sickness. Total amount of

For instance, children in Diradawa from 06-kebele areas are highly encouraged to go to project hope (living word believers church free clinic). The common diseases of the children encountered in 2015 are intestinal parasite, pneumonia, skin disease, acute respiratory infection and anemia.

Staff worker and project social worker have given regular teaching program of Health education for children and parents. During the project life teaching were Given by VEA Project staff or Volunteer, 1 times a month and different issues, especially on outbreak situations like HIV/AIDS, family planning, TB, malaria, sanitation issues, and etc. Hygienic materials such as soap, hair oil, Vaseline, and blanket were also distributed based on the plan per to children. Monthly teaching program for children has been done continuously.

#### 2.1.4 Supporting intuitional birth at Sirinka health center

Sirinak project 's remarkable achievement was Support given for Kebele health center, to take of Mothers who gave broth in medical Center, the 10 kg flour support made huge impact to encourage mothers to give birth in the health center.

#### 2.2.1 EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITY/SUPPORT

Now all registered children are provided with educational supports like school fee, uniform, exercise books, pens and pencils, school bags, recognizing the fact that education is the key determinant of holistic development. So, the project has been encouraging the children in the program to attend regular school and tutorial class in their school and rented house.

The tutorial class mainly designed to make up the passive learners at the regular school in different subjects like Mathematics, English and General Science. For such task the project used to hire many professionals in the field of education and related subject matters.

After school tutorial attendance didn't was not facilitated in Sirinka, Wonji and shire / Shemalba projects, due to several reasons one the tutorials are not given in convenient location, children either has to travel long distance or tutorial is not facilitated for primary education. Two most of the children were every young and unable to come to study

#### 2.2.3 SCHOOL AWARD

Vision for Ethiopian School Award for the best student and teacher of the year has given

Effective result to inspire and support all children and teachers. The award is done on Japan Primary schools for the Ethiopian school year 2007. The Award also gives motivation gift to teacher for the school that got higher score in their midterm evaluation

The award this year is done on two Primary schools; Gendtesfay primary school of Diradawa and Japan primary school of Sirinka; However Diberberhan project commence the computation among VEA children and took best performing children as well as children who have passed 8 grade, 10 and 12 grade national exam to filed trip to Hawassa. Even if around 30,00 birr was planed for school awared it only 18,00 birr that was abel to expende.

#### 2.2.4 Pre primary Education

Support for the teachers salary and running cost of the school give to Tabsy Medihanalme Kindergarten monthly 3300 ETB and due to this support over 185 children age 3-7 get to attend Kg. Around 22 children form Diradawa are also sent to KG in privet school, costing 150birr per child. Attending pre primary education, which is vital for their skill development at early age. Monthly Partners meet with VEA project staff and Volunteers form Partner Church to discuss basics child Development about proper and effective way to discipline children and how to show them right way to do things.

#### 2.2.5 Summer Education

Main focused on tutorial on their English languages skill development and, ethical education. Almost all children in tow shift program (morning and afternoon) spent the 2-month summer at the children center. Summer sport activity was done in Diradawa and Diberberhan projects, Boys and Girls practiced and computed, in various sport activities.

Where as in Diradawa, kids form Dachto and Sabine area, formed football team for both Girls and Boys and had summer tournament. The very idea of this summer sport activity was to help the children spend their vacation doing something useful rather than staying around bad neighborhoods

All projects now have TV rooms that are open for children in the weekend. Carefully selected movies and TV programs are available. On tope of that musical instrument worth 13,000 birr was donated by sponsor from Edmonto for Diberberhan.

#### 2.2.4 Recreation and entertainment for children

town. Additionally, educational trips and visiting were also activities they came along. As a child who deserves a lot fun and entertainment this service is undoubtly vital for their healthy growth.

#### 2.2.1 FOOD SUPPORT

Priority areas of VEA for enhanced child wellbeing in the first place is **Welfare & Safety** - addressing immediate needs of **needy** children through feeding; such as Monthly groceries such as (Pasta 1kg, Macaroni 2kg, flour 2kg, oil 2 liter, Rica 2 kg.

**Remark;** Due to great variance between the amount of fund we got from Covenant International Ministry and the children we support, most of the project activates are unable to be executed in full capacity

#### 2.2.2. CLOTH AND SHOE SUPPORT

Since poor parents are in obvious difficulties for affording for clothes and shoes to their children the project provides school uniforms, casual wears, shoes, each year.

#### 2.3 PSYCHO-SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT SUPPORT

#### 2.3.1. COUNSELING

It is vital that children should grow in good manner by having understandings of respecting societal accepted norms and cultures. They should also suppose to know how to honor others' dignity. For all such good quality behavior achievement we were diligently teaching and guiding them on the right path. This helped us keeping most of them from behaving in unwanted and unsafe behavioral conditions.

#### 2.3.2. HOME TO HOME VISIT

Each year all projects plan and implement Home-to-Home Visit for each Child, as a result of this visit, projects now understood how most of the Children are handled in their home.

Findings from home visit show, almost all children share bed with sibling or other family members, they don't have space to study or do their home work at home and they have lots of responsibility at home (fetching water, looking after young sibling, taking care of sick mother or grand parent and the like). All this has adverse effect on their educational performance as well as behavior.

#### 4. INCOME GENERATING

All interested Parents and also those living with HIV/AIDS were encouraged to participate in first skill development training for minimum of one month with choose of their interest.

Most of the women choose hand craft such as (beading, basketry, waving, and the like which eventual leads them to start different small-scale business so as to ensure their economic stability and food security. Along with the skill development training on handcraft, they also got basic business training

As a result, 85 parents/ guardians are participated in income generating activities about birr 2500.00 per each individual. Most of them are now leaning to transferred their new skill to income means, fruits of this project is expected in the for the coming.

#### 4.2 MEASURES TAKEN

- Church leaders, project committees and other volunteers mobilized to help staffs.
- We are dealing with donors to increase the manpower and increase the number of children.

- Giving awareness to parents to follow-up their children.
- We gave children education related orientation and counseling, also we followed them up to motivate in their educational achievements.

#### 3. LESSONS LEARNT DURING THE PROJECT LIFE

We learnt that good results have been achieved by having: -

- -Close and good relationship with benefiting children and parents/guardians.
- -Effective supervision and staff teamwork was the wonderful instrument for the successful of the project.
- -Adhering smooth and friendship cooperation with partners and governmental bodies accelerates the gear of the development.
- -Making the children busy by important and teachable things in order to protect them from bad practices.
- -Serving with great hearts can possibly bring drastic change of communal transformation.

#### 5. RESULT OBTAINED (OUTCOME AND IMPACT)

- Our children academic status has been improved dramatically. For instance 68 percent of them scored 76% average marks.
- Almost 95 percent (those who are expected to do so) of them attend their tutorial classes regularly with great interest of learning.
- The parents/guardians and children got good awareness about HIV/ADIS, family planning, personal hygiene, malaria, etc.
- At least 206 children got school and health treatment opportunity.
- Health status of the children improved due to the regular health screening, which is done by physician and treatment at health center and hospitals.
- The children got good knowledge about their country, nature and their cultural heritages.
- We saw in the heart of good future and self-confidence and thus, they are boldly understood that they can be successful.
